Charlene includes seasonal subject matter and continues to focus on the beginner while offering growth in skills for those experienced in the medium. In each class, participants complete a painting based on a traced image so there is no need to know how to draw. Each painting features specific watercolor techniques to develop and enhance skills.

Craft Brewing in the Pacific Northwest: The Process, The Business, The Beer • Single Class

How is beer made and what's it like to be a craft brewer in the Pacific Northwest? This class, taught by a local brewer from Logan Brewing Company, will answer these questions and arm you with information for your next visit to a local brew pub.

ABOUT THE INSTRUCTOR



Michael Woodruff is the head brewer and co-owner of Logan Brewing Company in Burien, Washington. His interest in brewing first took hold during college years while pursuing his undergraduate degree in fermentation science. Michael worked as a brewer in South Dakota, attaining his first head brewer job in Minnesota a few years later. He and his

business partner first met in college at UC Davis, and they later reconnected to start Logan Brewing Company. Four years after their grand opening in August 2020, the business continues to grow as a part of the remarkable Washington craft beer community.

Seeing Salvation: Tradition and Innovation in Christian Art • Two-part Series

Following two classes in May of 2024, we pick up this course that is based on the exhibition "Seeing Salvation" at the National Gallery in London (2000) and its catalogue. The exhibition presented the image of Christ to modern secular audiences through a selection of masterpieces of Christian art. Lectures cover works from early Christian Art and its changing styles from the Middle Ages to the present, and conclude with a focus on Renaissance artists in the Vatican and how they portrayed the image of Christ and the concept of "Salvation."


ABOUT THE INSTRUCTOR

She is the Executive Director of Tacoma Community House, a nonprofit in Tacoma with a 113-year history of serving immigrants and refugees. Board of Directors for Southwest Youth and Family Services for the past six years, an organization committed to providing resources for low-income families and youth.

Thursday, November 7 • 11:00am-12:00pm • Zoom



The Fourth Dimension: One Billion Years of Washington Geology - Part 1

This quarter, time travel with this third course of Dale's geology series! The Fourth Dimension will piece together our state's geology through the last one billion years of geologic time. Simply put, we will learn how Washington's geoscape evolved by going back through geologic eons, eras, periods, and epochs. We will put together the sequence of events which led to the geologic wonderland we explored in the first two courses. You will enjoy this class even if you were unable to attend the first two courses in the series (we will review as we go along). Join us as we explore the timing of our earthquakes, our volcanic eruptions, our natural disasters, and our intriguing glacial landscape!

ABOUT THE INSTRUCTOR



Dale Lehman (he/him) is the president of the Puget Lobe Chapter of the Ice Age Floods Institute, a member of the Geologic Society of America, and a member of the Northwest Geological Society. In 2014, he received the Outstanding Earth Science Teaching award from the National Association of Geoscience Teachers. Dale retired in 2021 after 36 years of teaching

geology and environmental science to students of all ages. During his long career, Dale worked as an adjunct instructor at UW, at CWU, and for the Tahoma School District in Maple Valley. Dale is eager to share his love of geology and the natural world through the Wesley U program.





The Importance of Vision and Eye Health in Aging • Single Class

In this presentation we learn about the main eye diseases that afflict older adults and what options exist to slow the onset of eye disease. We will see what parts of the eye are impacted by different eye diseases and learn data from studies, including the Women's Health Initiative, that examine vision's impact on social, emotional and physical health among older adults.

ABOUT THE INSTRUCTOR



Dr. Emily Gower, PhD, (she/her) is an ocular epidemiologist and clinical trialist whose work focuses on improving trichiasis surgery outcomes. She is an associate professor at University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and has played a lead role in clinical trials investigating use of antibiotics at the time of surgery and testing a new surgical device, the TT clamp. She

has taken the lead on developing a low-cost surgical simulator for improving training and supervision of trichiasis surgery technicians. Dr. Gower also maintains a portfolio of US-based ophthalmic epidemiology research focused on diabetic retinopathy, glaucoma and cataract surgery outcomes.

Gin Hammond (she/her) is an award-winning Harvard University/Moscow Art Theatre grad, as well as an actor, playwright, director, and author. She has performed onstage both nationally and internationally and has received grants from a variety of institutions, including the National Endowment for the Arts. Gin also works as a voice teacher, dialect coach, and voice-

over artist, and is known for her voice work in a variety of video games and audiobooks. She founded All Things Voice, and co-founded Meditations for Actors (MFA), a mobile meditation app designed specifically for actors. Her debut novel, Returning the Bones, a historical fiction travel novel with a dash of magical realism, was recently nominated for an INDIE Award.

The Future of Flying: An Exploration of New Aircraft Design and Energy Required to Support Advanced Air Mobility • Three-part Series

This series ushers us into the world of Advanced Air Mobility (AAM). We will learn about new aircraft design and related industries, the infrastructure required for such developments, and how sustainable aviation fuel (SAF), among other sources of energy, might fuel aircraft in the near future. Electric aviation, new industries and regulation, hydrogen and SAF as energy are part of the picture – see what is in store for the future of flight!

ABOUT THE INSTRUCTOR



Sarah Nilsson is a fixed-wing aircraft pilot holding FAA ATP, CFI, CFII, and MEI certificates. She was a commercial pilot for 17 years, but now flies her own PA-28-235 for fun. She also holds drone pilot certificates in the US, Canada, and UK. Sarah has been an Arizona-licensed attorney since 2014, and is also a professor at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University where she

teaches aviation law, drone law, and advanced air mobility courses. She is the author of several legal textbooks on these same topics.



Post-election Analysis: The 2024 Presidential Election and Critical Outcomes in Washington State • Single Class

This class will recap the outcomes of the 2024 elections in the U.S., focusing on the presidency and the races that determined control of the U.S. Senate and U.S. House. The class will look at the results of the top races in Washington State in 2024, including the open race for governor, state attorney general and U.S. Senate. The class will discuss what these results mean for American politics and policy more broadly, and the changes we are likely to see in Washington State as a result of the election outcomes.

ABOUT THE INSTRUCTOR



Travis N. Ridout is the Thomas S. Foley Distinguished Professor of Government and Public Policy and Director of the School of Politics, Philosophy and Public Affairs at Washington State University. He also serves as co-director of the Wesleyan Media Project, which tracks political advertising. His research on political campaigns, political advertising and campaign finance has appeared

in dozens of journal articles and book chapters. Ridout's most recent book, Political Advertising in the United States, 2nd edition, was published in 2021.
